Blabey, Aaron. The Bad Guys.

Brisson, Pat. Common critters: the wildlife in your neighborhood.

Educational backmatter about poetic technique and the natural histories of the animals completes the book.

Bryant, Jennifer. Above the rim: how Elgin Baylor changed basketball.

Though not as widely known as other basketball legends, hall-of-famer Elgin Baylor was one of the game's all-time greatest players--an innovative athlete, team player, and quiet force for change. A member of the early, scrappy NBA and one of the first professional African American players, Elgin (b. 1934) played in the late 1950s and early 1960s for the Minneapolis/Los Angeles Lakers, taking risks on and off the court. Known for his acrobatic style of moving and shooting, he inspired others to get creative with their game. But when traveling for away games, hotels and restaurants weren't as welcoming of Elgin as they were of his white teammates. Together, Elgin and his teammates boycotted

places practicing segregation until the entire NBA followed suit. [This book] is a peek into the early days of the NBA, a poetic telling of the life of an under-known athlete, and a celebration of standing up for what is right.

Coven, Wanda. Heidi Heckelbeck has a Secret.

After being homeschooled her whole life, Heidi Heckelbeck enters a real school in second grade, where she encounters a mean girl named Melanie who makes her feel like an alien.

Duffield, Katy. Crossings: extraordinary structures for extraordinary animals.

A non-fiction exploration of animal crossings built by animal lovers around the world to help animals cross over, under, around, and through human construction.

Fakher, Bassel Abou. Saving Stella.

A musician and his dog escape war-torn Syria.

Giroux, Benjamin. I am odd, I am new.

Through the eyes of 10-year-old Benjamin Giroux, being odd is different, and different is a good thing. This is what the then fifth-grader hoped to convey in his poem, beginning every few sentences with "I am," about what it is like to live with autism. Inspired by a school assignment, Benjamin's raw and emotional words poured out onto the page, but when he feared they were not any good, his parents shared the poem with friends and family. Little did they know that it would go viral and end up inspiring thousands of strangers who identified with him to share their support. Now for the first time, Benjamin's iconic poem I Am Odd, I Am New, comes to life in this lovingly illustrated picture book with a foreword written by the National Autism Association. So whether you know the poem, or it is new to you, discover how Benjamin's honesty will reassure children of all ages that it's okay to be different.

Gorman, Amanda. Change sings: a children's anthem.

As a young girl leads a cast of characters on a musical journey, they learn that they have the power to make changes--big or small--in the world, in their communities, and most importantly, in themselves.

Griffith, Evan. Secrets of the sea: the story of Jeanne Power, revolutionary marine scientist.

Presents a biography of the nineteenth-century woman scientist who pioneered the use of aquariums to study ocean life.

Gutman, Dan. Miss Daisy is crazy!

Miss Daisy's unusual teaching methods surprise her second grade students, especially reluctant learner A.J.

Hamilton, Kersten. First friend: how dogs evolved from wolves to become our best friends.

A sweet picture book about how dogs evolved from wolves to become man's best friend.

Harris, Shawn. Have You Ever Seen A Flower?

The story of Bessie Coleman, the first African American woman to earn her pilot's license.

Reynolds, Peter H. Our Table.

Violet longs for the time when her family was connected: before life, distractions, and technology pulled them all away from each other. They used to gather at the table, with food and love,

Ball, Georgia. I survived the Nazi invasion, 1944.

"It's been years since the Nazis invaded Max Rosen's home country of Poland. All the Jewish people, including Max's family, have been forced to live in a ghetto. At least Max and his sister, Zena, had Papa with them--until two months ago, when the Nazis took him away. Now Max and Zena are on their own. One day, with barely enough food to survive, the siblings make a daring escape from Nazi soldiers into the nearby forest. They are found by Jewish resistance fighters, who take them to a safe camp. But soon, grenades are falling all around them. Can Max and Zena survive the fallout of the Nazi invasion?

Levinson, Cynthia. The people's painter: how Ben Shahn fought for justice with art.

As an observant young child growing up in Lithuania, Ben Shahn yearns to draw everything he sees--and, after seeing his father banished by the Czar for demanding workers' rights, he develops a keen sense of justice, too. So when Ben and the rest of his family make their way to America, Ben brings with him both his sharp artistic eye and his desire to fight for what's right.
